A. PURPOSE:

The purpose of the Continuous Ambulatory Peritoneal Dialysis Assessment Report is:

1. To provide a standardized permanent document in the patient health record to report findings of a Continuous Ambulatory Peritoneal Dialysis Assessment.
2. To clearly indicate the intervention plan based on the assessment for referring physician.
3. To demonstrate compliance with Accreditation Canada's requirements for communication between care teams at a point of transfer of care.

B. DEFINITIONS:

1. Continuous Ambulatory Peritoneal Dialysis is a manual form of renal replacement therapy that uses the natural peritoneal membrane within the body as a filter to remove excess waste and fluid through an exchange process.
2. Renal Replacement Therapy is lifesaving treatment for patients with end-stage renal disease (ESRD).
3. Patient refers to all patients, clients and residents receiving health care services within Manitoba facilities and programs.

C. USED BY:

1. Nephrologists/Peritoneal Dialysis Unit to communicate to the referring physician the intervention plan based upon the Peritoneal Dialysis Assessment performed by multidisciplinary team.

D. PROCESS:

1. The Unit Clerk will ensure form stamped with patient addressograph.
2. The Nephrologist will indicate referring physician.
3. The Nephrologist will document any medical/social history/abdominal findings.

4. The Nephrologist will indicate patient's assessment suitability and intervention plan of pursuing Peritoneal Dialysis when Renal Replacement Therapy required.
 - a. The Nephrologist indicates the patient accepts possible risks that may negatively affect Peritoneal Dialysis.
 - o Patients' weight may require conversion to hemodialysis when residual renal function declines.
 - o Previous abdominal surgeries could negatively impact the peritoneal dialysis adequacy.
 - o Other possible causes.
5. The Nephrologist indicates that primary care will be transferred.
6. The Nephrologist indicates that the patient will need renal replacement therapy prior to placement of a peritoneal dialysis catheter or peritoneal dialysis could be initiated, responsibility for arranging hemodialysis remains with referring physician. Peritoneal dialysis catheter insertion booked for a later date.
7. The Nephrologist indicates the patient will need hernia repair surgery prior to Peritoneal Dialysis Catheter insertion and that general surgery has been consulted by the Nephrologist/Peritoneal Dialysis Unit.
8. The Nephrologist indicates patient is suitable for Peritoneal Dialysis but is undecided, primary care remains with referring physician and if patient decided to pursue peritoneal dialysis within six months to contact Nephrologist/Peritoneal Dialysis Unit. After six months a new referral is required.
9. The Nephrologist indicates the patient is suitable although not interested. Primary care is to remain with the referring physician.
10. The Nephrologist indicates patient is not suitable for Peritoneal Dialysis. Primary care remains with the referring physician:
 - a. The Nephrologist indicates medical reasons patient not suitable.
 - b. The Nephrologist indicates social reasons patient not suitable.
 - c. The Nephrologist indicates patient may be suitable for peritoneal dialysis if above medical/social issues resolved. A new referral is required.

E. FILING/ROUTING INSTRUCTIONS:

1. This form – W-00472 Continues Ambulatory Peritoneal Dialysis Assessment Report - is ordered from the Health Sciences Centre Print Shop.
2. The completed Continues Ambulatory Peritoneal Dialysis Assessment Report is faxed to the referring physician and then filed in the patient's Manitoba Renal Program, kidney health record.
